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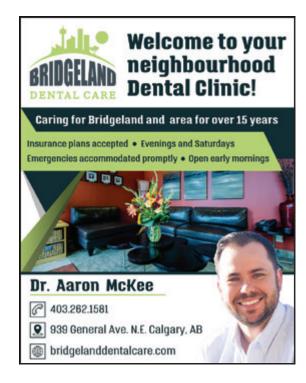
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EDITOR'S MESSAGE Q BRCA

With that, the parents lose out on the childcare, community, and comfort that comes with having a 'tribe' that can be seen in person. Who holds your baby while you go take a break? No one, we're in a Pandemic.

I decided to do a 100-copy print run from a local printer and felt confident my friends would appreciate the story. What I didn't expect was for 100 copies to sell out within hours of launching Pandemic Baby.

I ensured the pricing of the book was fair so that I could make my money back from printing and donate the rest to a local Calgary charity, The Children's Cottage Society.

As the popularity of my first book soars, I am working on a second book called Pandemic Baby's First Trip. This book is a nod to the babies who don't live near their relatives and may find themselves travelling and meeting family members in person for the first time.

Another Successful Community Clean-Up Day!





A "Litter Brigade" of 110 adults and 40 children came together Saturday, May 1 to pick up litter throughout Bridgeland-Riverside. A dozen dog owners also picked up dog waste on Tom Campbell's Hill (TCH). Many Bridgelanders also dropped off trash, organic waste, electronics, scrap metal, and donated household items at the Rehabilitation Society building. All in all, Bridgeland-Riverside is Greener and Cleaner as a result of our highly successful Clean-Up Day!

The BRCA Beautification Committee organized the day in partnership with: City of Calgary, Drop In Centre, Technotrash, Evraz Metals, and Flori & Deborah at TCH. Here are some highlights for the day:

The 2021 totals are much bigger than 2019 because the 2020 Clean-Up was cancelled due to COVID-19.

Litter Brigade registration was done outdoors at the BRCA Hall with COVID protocols. Volunteers picked their spots on the Bridgeland-Riverside map, which showed easy, intermediate, or hard areas based on hillside slopes, flat spaces, and streets/alleys. We had more volunteers than areas, so we were able to provide double coverage for high density litter zones.

A feedback survey, emailed to pre-registered volunteers, generated good information and suggestions for the 2022 Clean-up Day:

- The clean-up experience was rated 'Excellent' and 'Good'.
- Give out more litter bags.
- Improve litter bag drop off at Rehab Society.
- Add litter bag drop offs as per 2nd Avenue corners.
- Lots of cigarette butts especially around food businesses. "Butt cans" have been placed at benches in Murdoch Park and tables in the Piazza.
- Several new litter hot spots were identified.

After the Clean-Up Day, we have noticed Bridgelanders picking up litter on their own initiative. This is fantastic and strengthens our community. Our Beautification Committee continues the battle with litter by holding monthly "Litter Brigade" evenings on: May 20, June 17, July 15, August 19, September 16. All are welcome to join fellow Bridgelanders in the Piazza at 6:30 pm. Pickers, bags, and gloves will be supplied. Register online at www.brcacalgary.org, email hall@brcacalgary.org, or just show up at the Piazza.

The pathway and riverbank along Memorial Drive are not part of our Clean-Up Day because of safety concerns. However, the citywide Pathway and River Clean-Up will happen September 17 to 19. See www.calgary.ca for information and registration.

Let the Wild Remain Wild

Let wildlife remain wild so we can coexist. It can be exciting to see wildlife, but always best to observe safely. These pictures of Turk (the turkey that captured our hearts) and a coyote, were taken from my yard in Bridgeland.

Wild animals want to keep their distance from humans, and at the same time, they form an important part of the ecosystem. If the animals remain wild, it works very well, as animals like bobcats and coyotes will prey on animals such as mice, rabbits, and squirrels.

But humans cause issues when they feed wild animals. At first, this may seem innocent, but then those animals start to associate humans with a food source, and their comfort around humans increases. As their comfort increases, so does the risk of aggression and injury to humans. To avoid this, it is simple - never feed a wild

animal, including but not limited to, bobcats, coyotes, and deer. Urban environments, including the green spaces in the cities, provide a natural habitat for the animals to thrive. Wild animals frequently visit Bridgeland due to the community's proximity to the Bow River and Nose Creek. On that note, if you are aware of coyotes or bobcats nearby, it is best not to attract squirrels (and other small animals) to your yard by feeding them. The increased small animal population is easy prey. Speaking of prey, small dogs are vulnerable, so maybe keep them close. On the flip side, did you know coyotes see dogs similar in size to them (or bigger) as a threat?

Remember that an animal that becomes habituated to humans loses its natural fear of humans. There are things you can do to keep animals wild:

- Give them space, make noise, and never feed wildlife.
- Takeout foods and picnics are popular, but please place the trash in a garbage can. If the can is full, find another or take your trash with you.
- Attractants in your yard, like garbage or pet food, should not be accessible to wildlife.
- Protect your pets by keeping them on-leash unless in a designated off-leash area; if there are predators present, leash up your dog, even in an off-leash area, and keep your cats indoors.
- Teach children never to approach wild animals and supervise young children outside. Skunks and other critters may enter yards.
- Talk to your neighbours, especially if they are causing issues by attracting wildlife.

If a wild animal becomes habituated, never attempt to poison it. This is inhumane, and you may inadvertently poison a pet or child. Use other methods to encourage animals to move away from your house.

What you do matters. We all play a role in keeping the community safe.

Heat Related Illness

EMS would like to remind everyone to stay safe in the heat and sun this season. While children and the elderly may be more susceptible to the effects of heat and sun, basic prevention measures should be taken by all to avoid a heat related illness during periods of hot and humid weather.

Heat Exhaustion

- Heat exhaustion can occur due to excessive fluid loss during periods of prolonged sweating in a hot and/or humid environment (indoors or outdoors).
- Patients may suffer headaches, weakness, fatigue, nausea/vomiting, thirst, chills, and profuse sweating.
- The patient is usually cold and damp to the touch and the skin may appear pale, or dusky gray.

Heat Stroke

- Heat stroke is a medical emergency which, without prompt treatment, could be fatal.
- It occurs when the body can't cool itself naturally (e.g., perspiration). The body's temperature will continue to rise to dangerous levels.
- Due to severe dehydration and the inability to sweat, the patient may appear flushed, and skin may be hot and dry to the touch.

First Aid

- First aid for all heat related illness begins with removing or sheltering the patient from the hot environment.
- Remove excess, or tight-fitting clothing, and allow them to rest in a cool environment.
- If the patient is conscious and alert, provide suitable fluids such as water, juice, or a sports drink.
- If you are concerned, seek medical attention.

Prevention

- Stay well-hydrated by drinking plenty of water at all times.
- Be aware that excessive alcohol consumption will promote dehydration.
- Always wear a broad brimmed hat to keep the sun off your face and neck.
- Apply a broad spectrum, waterproof sunscreen with a minimum SPF of 30+, especially for children. The sun's UV rays peak between 11:00 am and 3:00 pm, even on cloudy days.

Bridgeland Riverside Continuing Care Centre Construction Update

The BRCCC Project Team is providing the following update to the Community. Regular updates will be provided as construction progresses.

- •The Bridgeland Riverside Continuing Care Centre is progressing into the next phase of construction.
- The construction trailer compound has been installed and perimeter fence installation to secure the site began on the east side of the site in early May 2021 and will continue until the site is completely secured.
- Excavation and removal of soil on the west side of the site continues and will be complete by early summer.
- Piling activities started early in May 2021 and will continue until early summer. It is expected water and utility services will be installed throughout the summer.
- The project team and contractor continue to monitor dust and will, when required, have a water truck available for dust control.
- •The project team continues to be committed to the community of Bridgeland-Riverside and are available to address concerns which the community may have. Please use the email address noted (INFRAS.BRCCC@gov.ab.ca) to forward your concerns and a response will be issued.
- •Thank you for your patience as construction continues to build a facility the community of Bridgeland-Riverside can be pleased with.

717 New Jobs Coming

Every year, I have actively encouraged local businesses and organizations to apply for the Canada Summer Jobs program and it has paid off. If local businesses and organizations do not apply, our community will not get the available funding.

This year the Canada Summer Jobs program will create 717 jobs in our community with \$2,697,184 in funding.

This is a new record and up from 415 jobs last year, 530 in 2019, 495 in 2018, and 361 in 2017. In addition, the funding associated with those jobs has doubled the amount of money coming into our community in just three years. I applaud all the applicants for ensuring that our community gets its fair share.

All jobs are required to be posted on www.jobbank. gc.ca to ensure equal access to all residents.

The Canada Summer Jobs program provides funding to assist employers to create summer opportunities for young people aged 15 to 30 years who are full-time students intending to return to their studies this fall.

With this funding, young people will learn or improve job skills and gain work experience with local employers in areas such as retail, hospitality, marketing, technology, research, and communications.

We all know the difficulties the pandemic has had on young workers and I believe this funding will go a long way to helping many youths in our community get that critical job experience they need.

If you are an employer and are having trouble filling a position, please let me know and I will share the opportunity in my newsletter. Together we can help those in our community seeking new employment.
