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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As you are aware, significant construction activity is occurring in our neighbourhood that will disrupt traffic and parking and will impact the commercial establishments operating in Bridgeland-Riverside for the majority of 2024 and again in 2025. The City of Calgary is doing its best to keep the BRCA, the Bridgeland Business Improvement Area (BIA), and individual businesses informed of the construction schedule and the changes to traffic and parking that are being made to accommodate the work and to try to lessen the impacts to businesses and residents. For example, temporary parking is being made available on the side streets adjacent to the blocks on 1 Avenue where parking is removed during construction. We are sharing the information we receive from the City on our website and social media.

We are fortunate to have wonderful businesses in our community. Our great restaurants, bars, cafés, medical and dental clinics, wellness and personal services facilities, pharmacies, food vendors, and many other retail establishments already face competitive and financial pressures. Disruptions to access and parking will add to their concerns. While we always encourage residents to patronize our local shops and services, the BRCA asks that you make an extra effort to do so while they are dealing with this period of construction.

Supporting our local businesses is a cornerstone of our community's vitality. These businesses are not just retail stores or restaurants; they are the heart of the local economy, contributing to the unique character and social fabric of Bridgeland-Riverside. When you choose to shop locally, you are investing in the community in several meaningful ways. Firstly, local businesses are more likely to reinvest a significant portion of their profits back into the local economy, fostering economic growth and sustainability. Additionally, they create job opportunities, keeping wealth within the community and often providing better wages compared to chain stores. Local businesses also contribute to the tax base, which supports public services and infrastructure. Moreover, they often source goods and services from other local businesses, creating a positive ripple effect that strengthens the local economy. Lastly, local businesses add a distinct flavour to the community,

Mostly flat, 5 km

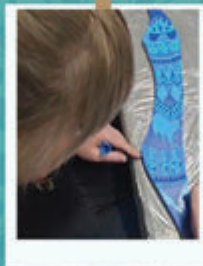
June 19 FIREWORKS LOOKOUTS

Paper Story, Connecting Community Through Papermaking: A Public Art Project Presented by the BRCA and Local Artist Andrea Lau

This summer, join us in a fun and informative art project that turns our neighbourhood weeds into sheets of handmade paper.

About Invasive Weeds

Invasive weeds can spread rapidly, causing severe crop losses and economic hardship. They are highly competitive and rob the soil of nutrients and growing space that should be supporting native plants. Many Bridgeland-Riverside residents grow food in gardens, want to maintain healthy yards, and keep our parks weed-free! This project works towards that goal.

Historically, many invasive species in North America were brought over by early settlers for medicinal, agricultural, and ornamental uses, without realizing their future negative impacts to local biodiversity.

Weed Drop-Off

Drop off to Andrea at the Farmers' Market Information Booth on Thursdays from 3:30 to 7:30 pm starting June 20. Please remove as much soil as possible and use a cardboard box or paper bag as a container. We will be accepting all types of weeds.

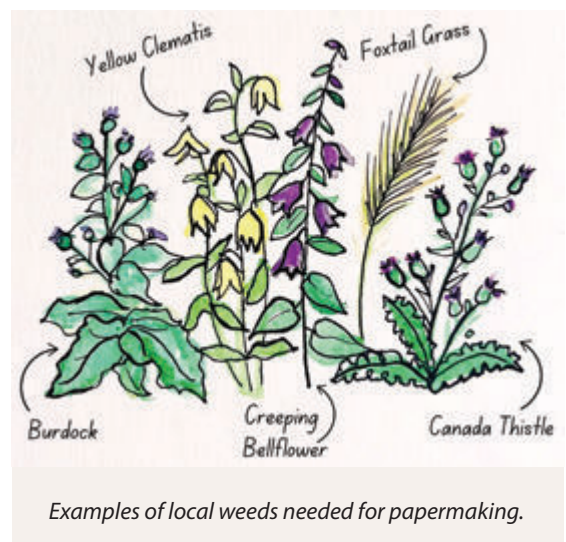
Register For a Papermaking Workshop

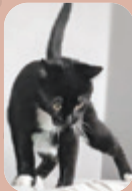

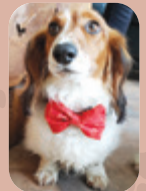

Backyard Play Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children this summer. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, always ensure play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suited to the age and skill of the children using it. Check the equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. It's also advised to set up play equipment on top of a nine-inch layer of shock-absorbing material which extends six feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water Hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four.
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose.
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate (*Alberta Building Code).

Lawn and Garden Tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment.
- Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces.
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect Bites and Stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions.
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors.
- Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home.
- To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect, always wear footwear outdoors.
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it.
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 911.
